Meeting Procedures

The Ralph M. Brown Act is the state law which guarantees the public's right to attend and participate in meetings of local legislative bodies. These rules have been adopted by the Town of Yucca Valley Town Council in accordance with the Brown Act, Government Code 54950 et seq., and shall apply at all meetings of the Yucca Valley Town Council, Commissions and Committees.

<u>Agendas</u> - All agendas are posted at Town Hall, 57090 Twentynine Palms Highway, Yucca Valley, at least 72 hours in advance of the meeting. Staff reports related to agenda items may be reviewed at the Town Hall offices located at 57090 Twentynine Palms Highway, Yucca Valley.

Agenda Actions - Items listed on both the "Consent Calendar" and "Items for Discussion" contain suggested actions. The Town Council will generally consider items in the order listed on the agenda. However, items may be considered in any order. Under certain circumstances new agenda items can be added and action taken by two-thirds vote of the Town Council.

<u>Closed Session Agenda Items</u> - Consideration of closed session items, *excludes* members of the public. These items include issues related to personnel, pending litigation, labor negotiations and real estate negotiations. Prior to each closed session, the Mayor will announce the subject matter of the closed session. If final action is taken in closed session, the Mayor shall report the action to the public at the conclusion of the closed session.

Public Testimony on any Item - Members of the public are afforded an opportunity to speak on any listed item. Individuals wishing to address the Town Council should complete a "Request to Speak" form, provided at the rear of the meeting room, and present it to the Town Clerk prior to the Council's consideration of the item. A "Request to Speak" form must be completed for *each* item when an individual wishes to speak. When recognized by the Mayor, speakers should be prepared to step forward and announce their name and address for the record. In the interest of facilitating the business of the Council, speakers are limited to up to three (3) minutes on each item. Additionally, a twelve (12) minute limitation is established for the total amount of time any one individual may address the Council at any one meeting. The Mayor or a majority of the Council may establish a different time limit as appropriate, and parties to agenda items shall not be subject to the time limitations.

The Consent Calendar is considered a single item, thus the three (3) minute rule applies. Consent Calendar items can be pulled at Council member request and will be brought up individually at the specified time in the agenda allowing further public comment on those items.

Agenda Times - The Council is concerned that discussion takes place in a timely and efficient manner. Agendas may be prepared with estimated times for categorical areas and certain topics to be discussed. These times may vary according to the length of presentation and amount of resulting discussion on agenda items.

<u>Public Comment</u> - At the end of the agenda, an opportunity is also provided for members of the public to speak on any subject with Council's authority. *Matters raised under "Public Comment" may not be acted upon at that meeting. The time limits established in Rule #4 still apply.*

<u>Disruptive Conduct</u> - If any meeting of the Council is willfully disrupted by a person or by a group of persons so as to render the orderly conduct of the meeting impossible, the Mayor may recess the meeting or order the person, group or groups of person willfully disrupting the meeting to leave the meeting or to be removed from the meeting. Disruptive conduct includes addressing the Council without first being recognized, not addressing the subject before the Council, repetitiously addressing the same subject, failing to relinquish the podium when requested to do so, or otherwise preventing the Council from conducting its meeting in an orderly manner. *Please be aware that a NO SMOKING policy has been established for all Town of Yucca Valley meetings. Your cooperation is appreciated!*

Mayor Rowe opened the public hearing and questioned if any written communications have been received. Town Clerk Anderson advised she has not received any.

Administrative Services Director Yakimow advised that anticipated General Fund revenues total \$9.4 million and current General Fund expenditures total \$9.2 million. The budget includes a recommendation to allocate "surplus" funds in the amount of \$230,000 or about 2.5% of revenues towards the Town's infrastructure maintenance

deficit and incorporates the strategic planning efforts into the budget development to align priorities. It was noted the goal is to get to the 10% level on road maintenance funding.

Town Manager Nuaimi commented regarding the public safety budget noting the planned school district partnership for the School Resource officer in the amount of \$25,000 the CHP grant award of \$125,000 over three years; and the grant integration – SLESF in the amount of \$100,000 are all assumed in the budget, The deferral of the COWCAP to January 2013 for a savings of \$31,000 is not, but brings the Town closer to being able to fund the Sheriff Service Specialist next year.

Administrative Services Director Yakimow reported regarding the partnership changes and advised that it has been said that the Town was going to cut the amount of the Boys & Girls Club by \$5,000 per year until it is zeroed out, and clarified that that is not going to happen. He explained the funding history of the Contract. Town Manager Nuaimi added that a component of the Community Services program budget that is being cut is the Sunday open play basketball hours for adults, noting that will reduce the amount of hours the Town is using the Club. We have no intention of reducing the funding to zero over a period of time. In addition, at the June 5th hearing, Staff was given direction to look at cuts in partnerships at mid-year to see what the Town can do to reinstate the funding.

Administrative Services Director Yakimow advised personnel program changes include the reclassification/promotion of an Administrative Assistant III to Management Analyst/Deputy Town Clerk, an Administrative Assistant II to Administrative Assistant III and Code Compliance Tech to Code Compliance Officer I; there is no COLA again this year; employees continue to pay their full retirement contribution; the RDA allocation for Planning Staff is eliminated so the full funding will come from the General Fund; and there is the addition of one half-time Parks Department position.

Town Manager Nuaimi advised that the Council will be back in July to discuss strategies regarding revenue sources, etc.

Administrative Services Director Yakimow gave an overview of the special revenue funds noting they are all balanced. Town Manager Nuaimi added that Measure I money is the only transportation funding.

Sam Hadley, Boys & Girls Club, spoke in opposition to reducing funding to the Club.

Stacy Hadley, Yucca Valley, did not wish to speak but expressed opposition to reduced funding for the Boys & Girls Club.

Syndi Carlson, Yucca Valley, spoke in opposition to reduced funding for the Boys &

Girls Club.

Tracy Stockman, Yucca Valley, spoke in opposition to reduced funding to the Boys & Girls Club.

Donna Davies, Yucca Valley, spoke in opposition to reduced funding to the Boys & Girls Club.

Shannon Luckino, Yucca Valley, spoke in opposition to reduced funding for the Boys & Girls Club.

Others in opposition to cutting funding to the Boys & Girls Club but not wishing to speak included Kevin Weber, Jack Rarick, and Laurie Klimowicz.

Margo Sturges, Yucca Valley, applauded Town employees for not having a COLA and paying the full 8% toward their retirement. Commented that there has never been any RDA funding for roads or maintenance in the Town Budget. She also applauded Mayor Rowe for foregoing medical benefits.

Council Member Lombardo commended staff on what they have done to balance the budget. He challenged the community to write a check to the Boys & Girls Club to help cover the shortfall.

Council Member Hagerman questioned if the entire partnership portion of the budget is 2% of budget. Administrative Services Director Yakimow advised it is a little bit less. Council Member Hagerman commented that with that 2% we either support or assist 11 different organizations, and noted he doesn't see the funding going to the Club as a partnership, but as a facility rental. He questioned if staff sees it as a facilities rental. Town Manager Nuaimi advised that currently for the facilities we rent we are paying average of \$30 to \$35 per hour. Based on the number of hours we use the facility, roughly \$20,000 is for facility use, the balance is for the value of programing and service the club provides to the community.

Shannon Luckino, Yucca Valley, commented that she does understand how difficult it is to do a budget, and knows that quality of life and safety are key issues. This is a quality of life issue.

Jack Rarick, Yucca Valley, spoke in opposition to reducing the funding.

There being no one else wishing to speak Mayor Rowe closed the Public Hearing.

Council Member Huntington commented that he has been involved with the Boys & Girls Club since they started, noting it meets social service needs that the Town

requires. Programs cost money and the youth we are looking at in the club don't have that money. They are an underserved group at risk. He advised of the need to improve on our communication to allow these groups to know how much they are going to get each year in advance. He is not adverse to finding \$15,000 in the budget and dividing it among the three groups that have had reduced funding.

Council Member Abel advised he was concerned regarding the decrease in our usage of the club. The club is an excellent return on our investment and he agreed with the idea of reinstating full funding for the Boys & Girls Club and the Chamber of Commerce.

Council Member Hagerman advised it is no secret that outside agencies can do things cheaper, noting he can justify giving the entire \$48,000 per year to the Club just on facility use alone for the basketball program. He proposed that the Club meet with Community Services Director Schooler and the Museum staff to see if they can take on any of the programs to see if we can bridge that \$5,000 gap. He is in favor of keeping the amount at \$48,000.

Mayor Rowe commented that Council Member Huntington suggested looking at funding at mid-year and allowing us to know where we stand at the State level with funding. We have cut everything back in this economic time, and she would also advocate looking at it again at mid-year when know where the budget stands. She cautioned Council regarding allocating that money during this tight budget time. She also agreed that we can do better job of communicating.

Council Member Lombardo commented there are so many unknowns coming from the State that he does think it would be prudent to put off any addition until midyear, and he also agreed we need to communicate better.

Mayor Rowe, commented that there is a need to find additional revenue sources and stated that she does not think it is unreasonable to charge a nominal fee to go into the Museum. Town Manager Nuaimi advised that Museum staff has looked at it and studied the implications of that, however you have a facilities with two doors at opposite ends of the building charging is problematic. He noted that a vast majority of our services are non-revenue generating. Staff will go back and give strategies for funding the \$5,000. Town Manager Nuaimi added that the Museum staff actively goes after grant dollars to defray the costs of their programs.

Council Member Hagerman advised he wants to somehow articulate that we are not cutting other services in community services. Administrative Services Director Yakimow commented the amounts Council is talking about are not material with respect to their impact on reserves etc. If Council's desire is to add additional funding, it is just going to reduce amount between revenues and expenditures.

Mayor Rowe questioned if we would still cut the Sunday gym time even if we reinstate funding at the full \$5,000. Community Services Director Schooler advised that is not a viable program. Town Manager Nuaimi stated the Town of Yucca Valley is still waiting to hear what the property tax is going to be and cautioned that the Assessor is still lowering assessments, which is why we didn't automatically allocate the proposed surplus of \$230,000 to road maintenance yet.

Council Member Huntington commented that the community partnerships were not cut at all this year, just the three contracts, and advised he is not opposed to looking at them at midyear to get the dollars back up.

Administrative Services Director Yakimow stated that one of the comments from the public was that RDA funding was never allocated to be utilized for infrastructure and clarified that RDA funding has been used in our commercial corridor for many years for infrastructure funding.

Council Member Huntington moved to adopt Resolution No. 12-20, approving the Fiscal Year 2012-13 proposed budget, and designating those officials authorized to make requisitions for encumbrances against appropriations; adopt Resolution No. 12-21, establishing the spending limitation for Fiscal Year 2012-13; adopt Resolution No. 12-22, authorizing positions for Fiscal Year 2012-13, and authorizing pay ranges for such positions for Fiscal Year 2012-13, effective with the payroll dated July 20, 2012; approve an amendment to the contract with the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department, and authorize the Town Manager to sign on behalf of the Town; approve the staff recommendation regarding the public safety budget including the continuation of the FY 2011-12 funding level, with the intent to absorb any potential reduction in hours through grant applications, current grant funding, or specialized task force activity, and direct staff to return at mid-year budget review with an update; approve the staff recommendation for the reservation of fund balance in an amount of \$232,000 to be used in meeting a portion of the Town's infrastructure deficit as part of the FY 2013-14 Infrastructure Plan; and direct staff to return at midyear to discuss funding for the Boys & Girls Club, Chamber of Commerce and DRTA, Council Member Abel seconded. Motion carried 3-2.

With the exception of Street and Drainage Maintenance District 5 which is the Home Depot, the projects have not been constructed, so the Assessment Engineer's report recommends a levy in the amount to recover costs of these districts.

Mayor Rowe opened the Public Hearing and as no one appeared to speak, she closed the hearing.

Council Member Hagerman moved to adopt Resolution No. 12-23, approving and confirming the assessments as set forth in the Engineer's Reports and declare its intent to levy and collect assessments upon real property within the existing districts for the 2012-13 tax year, and authorize the levy of assessments as recommended in the Engineer's Reports. Council Member Lombardo seconded. Motion carried 5-0.

21. HDWD / Town Water Supply Agreement

Town Manager Nuaimi advised that for the better part of year Town staff has been working with the Water District on a water agreement. The terms necessitate the Town making a deposit of \$400,000 toward the pre-purchase of water. Based upon current usage, the agreement amounts to approximately ten years of usage. The Town would be charged the commodity costs associated with acquiring the supplemental water as well as operational costs associated with delivering it to the parks. The agreement will yield annual savings to the Town in excess of \$40,000 based upon current irrigation expenditures. After publication of agenda we did receive clarification from the District

indicating there is a change required to Section 4(d) to read "if the Town desires to make additional contributions to the supplemental water account in the future, the Parties agree to meet to discuss that possibility at that time".

Margo Sturges, Yucca Valley, commented it sounds like a good investment on the part of the Town for a savings of \$40,000 per year, but questioned if it will pass the requirements of Prop 218.

Ed Musik, Yucca Valley, advised that the Town and District have worked on the agreement for a long time and with the amendment the contract will be compliant with Prop 218.

Council Member Hagerman thanked Mr. Muzik, Town Manager Nuaimi, Administrative Services Director Yakimow and Frank Luckino for putting this agreement together, noting it is another good step for the overall benefit of the citizens of the Town.

Council Member Abel questioned if legal counsel is comfortable with the changes. Town Attorney Laymon advised that she is.

Council Member Lombardo commended the Town/Hi Desert Water District partnership.

Council Member Abel moved to approve the Water Supply Agreement between the Town and the Hi-Desert Water District ("District") as amended; and direct Town staff to return to the Council with the related budget adjustments prior to execution of this transaction. Council Member Hagerman. Motion carried 5-0.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Sarann Graham, Yucca Valley, advised that on July 16th the District will be hosting Special Districts here in Yucca Valley. She clarified how the State Revolving Fund works.

STAFF REPORTS AND COMMENTS

Town Manager Nuaimi thanked Administrative Services Director Yakimow and his staff for all their efforts to get the budget out during a very difficult budget cycle, due to the dissolution of RDAs and the gauntlet the State has made everyone run through. He added the Budget process we went through this year will not be the budget same process we do next year. There were a lot of activities with limited staff and he sent apologies to those organizations for not communicating clearly. The Town appreciates and values having those kinds of resource in the community. He added he appreciates all the input receive from the Council, and thanked the directors for their work. Congratulated Animal Care & Control Manager Crider. Requested

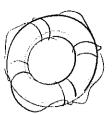

Discussion: AB1234 requires members of a legislative body to report on "meetings" attended at public expense at the next meeting of the legislative body. "Meetings" for purpose of this section are tied to the Brown Act meaning of the term: any congregation of a majority of the members of a legislative body at the same time and place to hear, discuss, or deliberate upon any item that is within the subject matter jurisdiction of the legislative body or the local agency to which it pertains. Qualifying expenses include reimbursement to the member related to meals, lodging, and travel.

An example of when a report is required is when a Town Council member represents his or her agency on a joint powers agency board and the Town pays for the official's expenses in serving in that representative capacity. Additionally, in the spirit of AB1234, the Yucca Valley Town Council also reports all travel related to conference and training attended at public expense.

Although the AB1234 report can be either written or oral, this report must be made at the next meeting of the legislative body that paid for its member to attend the meeting.

Prior Council Review: On March 13, 2012, the Town Council authorized staff to submit an application for improvements at four school locations within the Town through the SR2S program.

Recommendation: That the Town Council:

- Accepts the SR2S grant funds in the amount of \$399,800, and authorizes staff to proceed with all phases of the project, including submittal of the Request for Allocation to Caltrans.
- Authorizes staff to release a Request For Proposal (RFQ/RFP) from qualified consultants for the design, plans, specifications, and cost estimates for the Project following necessary Caltrans approvals.
- Approves and authorizes the Town Manager as the designated signatory for the SR2S program.

Executive Summary: The California Department of Transportation issued a call for projects for the State legislated Safe Routes to School (SR2S) Program Cycle 10 funding. The program provides funding for capital projects that improve safety for children in grades K-12 who walk or bicycle to school and through infrastructure projects that incorporate education, encouragement, and enforcement activities that are intended to change community behavior and attitudes to increase the number of children walking or bicycling to school. Caltrans notified staff that the Town SR2S Application was successful and awarded \$399,800 for infrastructure.

Discussion: Staff submitted a SR2S Application to Caltrans on March 30, 2012. The SR2S program defines eligible projects in the following categories.

Pedestrian Facilities

Bicycle Facilities

Traffic Calming

Traffic Control Devices

The primary goals of the program are to reduce injuries and fatalities to school children and to encourage increased walking and bicycling amongst students. These goals are primarily implemented by constructing public improvements that improve and enhance safety for pedestrians and bicyclists who walk or bicycle to school.

The grant application included improvements at four school sites. The grant application consists of proposed improvements on Sage, between Onaga Trail and SR 62, consisting of sidewalks, curb, and gutter. Additionally, the application requested funds to replace 6 outdated electronic speed signs at Yucca Valley Elementary School, Onaga Elementary School, and La Contenta Middle School. The electronic components of the existing radar speed signs are outdated and replacement components are no longer available. The following provides a preliminary estimate of probable costs for the project.

While the grant funded improvements are located on local roadways, the project must still be processed through Caltrans as they are the State designated administrating agency for SR2S funds. The schedule calls for construction to be completed in mid-2013.

Fiscal impact: This cycle of the SR2S program require a 10% local match.

Fiscal Impact: The billings received from the signals and lighting at Balsa and Hanford are currently averaging approximately \$200.00 monthly. The mid year budget process allocated funds for payment of these costs.

Transportation Congestion Relief Program (TCRP)

Prior Council Review: On April 18, 2002, the Town entered into a cooperative agreement with Caltrans for the development of the SR-62 La Honda to Dumosa TCRP Project. On June 19, 2006, the Town executed an Amendment to the Cooperative Agreement (1159 A-1) to extend the termination date from 6-30-2006 to 12-31-2008. On November 21, 2008, The Town executed another Amendment to the Cooperative Agreement (1159 A-2) to extend the termination date from 12-31-2008 to December 31, 2011. On December 20, 2011, the Town executed another Amendment to the Cooperative Agreement (1159 A-3) to extend the termination date to December 31, 2013.

Recommendation: That the Town Council approves the Construction Cooperative Agreement No. 08-1542, and authorizes the Mayor to sign and execute the Cooperative Agreement.

Executive Summary: Town Council action is required to approve the Agreement. The Plans and Specifications are 100% complete and awaiting Caltrans Approval. Right of way acquisition is still required for the project, pending complete project funding.

Discussion: The SR-62 La Honda to Dumosa Project is a TCRP funded project. Funding includes project development and construction. Due to the fact that the project location is within Caltrans right-of-way, a Construction Cooperative Agreement is necessary.

The Town is in the final PS&E phase of the project, Town submitted 100% plans and specifications for Caltrans Approval, and the final approval is contingent on the submittal of Appraisal Map, which shows easements and right-of way lines for the properties adjacent

CONSTRUCTION COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT

TOWN OF YUCCA VALLEY, a public entity referred to as TOWN.

This Agreement, effective on	, is between the State of
California, acting through its Department of Transportation	n, referred to as CALTRANS, and:

For the purpose of this Agreement, the term PARTNERS hereinafter collectively refers to CALTRANS and TOWN (all signatory parties to this Agreement). The term PARTNER hereinafter refers to any one of those signatory parties individually.

RECITALS

- 1. California Streets and Highways Code sections 114 and 130 authorize PARTNERS to enter into a cooperative agreement for performance of work within the State Highway System (SHS) right of way.
- 2. For the purpose of this Agreement, the construction of sidewalks and installation raised curb medians at various locations from La Honda Way to Dumosa Avenue will be referred to hereinafter as PROJECT. All responsibilities assigned in this Agreement to complete Construction will be referred to hereinafter as OBLIGATIONS.
 - This agreement includes the following PROJECT COMPONENTS: CONSTRUCTION SUPPORT AND CONSTRUCTION CAPITAL.
- 3. This Agreement is separate from and does not modify or replace any other cooperative agreement or memorandum of understanding between PARTNERS regarding PROJECT.
- 4. Prior to this Agreement, TOWN developed the Project Initiation Document; TOWN developed the Project Report (Cooperative Agreement No. 1159, 1159 A/1, 1159 A/2, 1159 A/3); TOWN developed the Plans, Specifications and Estimate (Cooperative Agreement No. 1159, 1159 A/1, 1159 A/2, 1159 A/3); and TOWN developing the Right of Way Certification (Cooperative Agreement No. 1159, 1159 A/1, 1159 A/2, 1159 A/3).
- 5. CALTRANS signed and approved a Categorical Exemption and Categorical Exclusion, pursuant to CEQA and NEPA, on January 20, 2009.
- 6. The estimated date for OBLIGATION COMPLETION is June 30, 2016.
- 7. In this Agreement capitalized words represent defined terms and acronyms. The Definitions section contains a complete definition for each capitalized term.

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8. From this point forward, PARTNERS define in this Agreement the terms and conditions under which they will accomplish OBLIGATIONS.

RESPONSIBILITIES

- 9. TOWN is SPONSOR for 100% of PROJECT.
- 10. CALTRANS will provide IQA for the portions of WORK within existing and proposed SHS right of way. CALTRANS retains the right to reject noncompliant WORK, protect public safety, preserve property rights, and ensure that all WORK is in the best interest of the SHS.
- 11. TOWN is the only FUNDING PARTNER for this Agreement.

The details of the funding commitment are documented in the latest FUNDING SUMMARY.

- 12. CALTRANS is the CEQA lead agency for PROJECT.
- 13. CALTRANS is the NEPA lead agency for PROJECT.
- 14. TOWN is IMPLEMENTING AGENCY for CONSTRUCTION.

SCOPE

Scope: General

- 15. PARTNERS will perform all OBLIGATIONS in accordance with federal and California laws, regulations, and standards; FHWA STANDARDS; and CALTRANS STANDARDS.
- 16. IMPLEMENTING AGENCY for a PROJECT COMPONENT will provide a Quality Management Plan (QMP) for that component as part of the PROJECT MANAGEMENT PLAN. The District Construction Division, with input from Structure Construction must approve the Quality Management Plan (QMP) before the encroachment permit for construction is issued.
- 17. Any PARTNER may, at its own expense, have representatives observe any OBLIGATIONS performed by another PARTNER. Observation does not constitute authority over those OBLIGATIONS.
- 18. Each PARTNER will ensure that personnel participating in OBLIGATIONS are appropriately qualified or licensed to perform the tasks assigned to them.

- 19. IMPLEMENTING AGENCY shall retain consultants and shall invite CALTRANS to participate in the selection and retention of consultants that participate in OBLIGATIONS. At least one representative from the Construction Division of CALTRANS shall participate in the selection process. A construction management firm shall not be selected without the approval by this representative.
- 20. If WORK is done under contract (not completed by a PARTNER's own employees) and is governed by the California Labor Code's definition of "public works" (section 1720(a)(a)), that PARTNER will conform to sections 1720 1815 of the California Labor Code and all applicable regulations and coverage determinations issued by the Director of Industrial Relations.
- 21. IMPLEMENTING AGENCY for each PROJECT COMPONENT included in this Agreement will be available to help resolve WORK related problems generated by that component for the entire duration of PROJECT.
- 22. CALTRANS will issue, upon proper application, the encroachment permits required for WORK within SHS right of way.
 - Contractors and/or agents, and utility owners will not perform WORK within the SHS right of way without an encroachment permit issued in their name.
- 23. If any PARTNER discovers unanticipated cultural, archaeological, paleontological, or other protected resources during WORK, all WORK in that area will stop and that PARTNER will notify all PARTNERS within 24 hours of discovery. WORK may only resume after a qualified professional has evaluated the nature and significance of the discovery and a plan is approved for its removal or protection.
- 24. PARTNERS will hold all administrative drafts and administrative final reports, studies, materials, and documentation relied upon, produced, created, or utilized for PROJECT in confidence to the extent permitted by law and where applicable, the provisions of California Government Code section 6254.5(e) shall protect the confidentiality of such documents in the event that said documents are shared between PARTNERS

PARTNERS will not distribute, release, or share said documents with anyone other than employees, agents, and consultants who require access to complete PROJECT without the written consent of the PARTNER authorized to release them, unless required or authorized to do so by law.

- 25. If a PARTNER receives a public records request pertaining to OBLIGATIONS, that PARTNER will notify PARTNERS within five (5) working days of receipt and make PARTNERS aware of any disclosed public documents. PARTNERS will consult with each other prior to the release of any public documents related to the PROJECT.
- 26. If HM-1 or HM-2 is found during a PROJECT COMPONENT, IMPLEMENTING AGENCY for that PROJECT COMPONENT will immediately notify PARTNERS.
- 27. CALTRANS, independent of PROJECT, is responsible for any HM-1 found within the existing SHS right of way. CALTRANS will undertake HM MANAGEMENT ACTIVITIES related to HM-1 with minimum impact to PROJECT schedule.
- 28. TOWN, independent of PROJECT, is responsible for any HM-1 found within PROJECT limits and outside the existing SHS right of way. TOWN will undertake or cause to be undertaken HM MANAGEMENT ACTIVITIES related to HM-1 with minimum impact to PROJECT schedule.
- 29. If HM-2 is found within PROJECT limits, the public agency responsible for the advertisement, award, and administration (AAA) of the PROJECT construction contract will be responsible for HM MANAGEMENT ACTIVITIES related to HM-2.
- 30. CALTRANS' acquisition or acceptance of title to any property on which any HM-1 or HM-2 is found will proceed in accordance with CALTRANS' policy on such acquisition.
- PARTNERS will comply with all of the commitments and conditions set forth in the environmental documentation, environmental permits, approvals, and applicable agreements as those commitments and conditions apply to each PARTNER's responsibilities in this Agreement.
- 32. IMPLEMENTING AGENCY for each PROJECT COMPONENT will furnish PARTNERS with written quarterly progress reports during the implementation of OBLIGATIONS in that component.
- 33. Upon OBLIGATION COMPLETION, ownership or title to all materials and equipment constructed or installed for the operations and/or maintenance of the SHS within SHS right of way as part of WORK become the property of CALTRANS.
 - CALTRANS will not accept ownership or title to any materials or equipment constructed or installed outside SHS right of way.
- 34. IMPLEMENTING AGENCY for a PROJECT COMPONENT will accept, reject, compromise, settle, or litigate claims of any non-Agreement parties hired to do WORK in that component.
- 35. PARTNERS will confer on any claim that may affect OBLIGATIONS or PARTNERS' liability or responsibility under this Agreement in order to retain resolution possibilities

for potential future claims. No PARTNER will prejudice the rights of another PARTNER until after PARTNERS confer on claim.

- 36. PARTNERS will maintain, and will ensure that any party hired by PARTNERS to participate in OBLIGATIONS will maintain, a financial management system that conforms to Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP), and that can properly accumulate and segregate incurred PROJECT costs and billings.
- 37. If FUNDING PARTNERS fund any part of OBLIGATIONS with state or federal funds, each PARTNER will comply with the appropriate federal cost principles and administrative requirements outlined in the Applicable Cost Principles and Administrative Requirements table below. These principles and requirements apply to all funding types included in this Agreement.
- 38. If FUNDING PARTNERS fund any part of OBLIGATIONS with state or federal funds, each PARTNER will ensure that any party hired to participate in OBLIGATIONS will comply with the appropriate federal cost principles and administrative requirements outlined in the Applicable Cost Principles and Administrative Requirements table below.

- 39. PARTNERS will maintain and make available to each other all OBLIGATIONS-related documents, including financial data, during the term of this Agreement.
- 40. PARTNERS will retain all OBLIGATIONS-related records for three (3) years after the final youcher.
- 41. PARTNERS have the right to audit each other in accordance with generally accepted governmental audit standards.

CALTRANS, the state auditor, FHWA (if PROJECT utilizes federal funds), and TOWN will have access to all OBLIGATIONS-related records of each PARTNER, and any party hired by a PARTNER to participate in OBLIGATIONS, for audit, examination, excerpt, or transcription.

The examination of any records will take place in the offices and locations where said records are generated and/or stored and will be accomplished during reasonable hours of operation. The auditing PARTNER will be permitted to make copies of any OBLIGATIONS-related records needed for the audit.

The audited PARTNER will review the draft audit, findings, and recommendations, and provide written comments within 30 calendar days of receipt.

Upon completion of the final audit, PARTNERS have 30 days to refund or invoice as necessary in order to satisfy the obligation of the audit.

Any audit dispute not resolved by PARTNERS is subject to dispute resolution. Any costs arising out of the dispute resolution process will be paid within 30 calendar days of the final audit or dispute resolution findings.

- 42. If FUNDING PARTNERS fund any part of PROJECT with state or federal funds, each FUNDING PARTNER will undergo an annual audit in accordance with the Single Audit Act of OMB Circular A-133.
- 43. Any PARTNER that hires another party to participate in OBLIGATIONS will conduct a pre-award audit of that party in accordance with the *Local Assistance Procedures Manual*.
- 44. PARTNERS will not incur costs beyond the funding commitments in this Agreement. If IMPLEMENTING AGENCY anticipates that funding for WORK will be insufficient to complete WORK, IMPLEMENTING AGENCY will promptly notify SPONSOR.
 - IMPLEMENTING AGENCY has no obligation to perform WORK if funds to perform WORK are unavailable.
- 45. If WORK stops for any reason, IMPLEMENTING AGENCY will place PROJECT right of way in a safe and operable condition acceptable to CALTRANS.
- 46. If WORK stops for any reason, each PARTNER will continue to implement all of its applicable commitments and conditions included in the PROJECT environmental documentation, permits, agreements, or approvals that are in effect at the time that WORK stops, as they apply to each PARTNER's responsibilities in this Agreement, in order to keep PROJECT in environmental compliance until WORK resumes.

- 47. Each PARTNER accepts responsibility to complete the activities that it selected on the SCOPE SUMMARY. Activities marked with "N/A" on the SCOPE SUMMARY are not included in the scope of this Agreement.
- 48. Contract administration procedures shall conform to CALTRANS' Construction Manual, Local Assistance Procedures Manual (if Federal funds are used), and the PROJECT encroachment permits.
- 49. If the Resident Engineer is not also a registered Landscape Architect, TOWN will furnish, at TOWN expense and subject to approval of CALTRANS Landscape Architecture, a registered Landscape Architect to perform work related to architecture treatment and landscaping and to perform the function of an Assistant Resident Engineer/Inspector who is responsible for both daily on-site inspection and final decisions including, but not limited to, any highway planting and the irrigation systems that comprise a portion of the PROJECT work, consistent with any applicable measures in the environmental commitments record. Final decisions shall continue to be subject to the satisfaction and approval of CALTRANS.
- 50. Within one hundred eighty (180) days following the completion and acceptance of the PROJECT construction contract, to furnish CALTRANS with a complete set of "AsBuilt" plans (hard copy and electronic formats) in accordance with CALTRANS' then current CADD Users Manual, Plans Preparation Manual, and CALTRANS practice. The submittal must also include all CALTRANS requested contract records, including survey documents and Records of Surveys (to include monument perpetuation per the Land Surveyor Act, section 8771, including but not limited to preconstruction monumentation documents and a post construction Record of Survey that have been filed with the County Surveyor's Office). TOWN shall also submit corrected full-sized hardcopy structure plans.

Scope: Environmental Permits, Approvals and Agreements

51. Each PARTNER identified in the Environmental Permits table below accepts the responsibility to complete the assigned activities.

Scope: CONSTRUCTION

52. TOWN will advertise, open bids, award, approve, and administer the construction contract in accordance with the California Public Contract Code and the California Labor Code.

TOWN will not advertise the construction contract until CALTRANS completes or accepts the final plans, specifications, and estimate package; CALTRANS approves the Right of Way Certification; and SPONSOR verifies full funding of CONSTRUCTION SUPPORT and CONSTRUCTION CAPITAL.

By accepting responsibility to advertise and award the construction contract, TOWN also accepts responsibility to administer the construction contract.

PARTNERS agree that TOWN is designated as the Legally Responsible Person and the Approved Signatory Authority pursuant to the Construction General Permit, State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) Order Number 2009-0009-DWQ, as defined in Appendix 5, Glossary, and assumes all roles and responsibilities assigned to the Legally Responsible Person and the Approved Signatory Authority as mandated by the Construction General Permit.

- 53. TOWN will provide a RESIDENT ENGINEER, licensed to practice Civil Engineering in the State of California, and CONSTRUCTION SUPPORT staff that are independent of the design engineering company and construction contractor.
- 54. TOWN will implement changes to the construction contract through contract change orders (CCOs). PARTNERS will review and concur on all CCOs over \$50,000.
 - CALTRANS must approve all CCOs affecting public safety or the preservation of property, all design and specification changes, and all major changes as defined in the CALTRANS *Construction Manual* prior to implementing the CCO.
- 55. If FUNDING PARTNERS fund any part of OBLIGATIONS with state or federal funds TOWN will use a CALTRANS-approved construction contract claims process, will administer all claims through said process, and will be available to provide advice and technical input in any claims process.
- 56. If the lowest responsible construction contract bid is greater than the funding commitment to CONSTRUCTION CAPITAL, all FUNDING PARTNERS must be involved in determining how to proceed. If FUNDING PARTNERS do not agree in writing on a course of action within 15 working days, the IMPLEMENTING AGENCY shall not award the construction contract.
- 57. TOWN will require the construction contractor to furnish payment and performance bonds naming TOWN as obligee, and CALTRANS as additional obligee, and to carry liability insurance in accordance with CALTRANS specifications.

- 58. TOWN will submit a written request to CALTRANS for any SFM identified in the PROJECT plans, specifications, and estimate a minimum of 45 days prior to the bid advertisement date for PROJECT construction contract. TOWN will submit a written request to CALTRANS for any additional SFM deemed necessary during PROJECT construction.
- 59. CALTRANS will make SFM available at a CALTRANS-designated location after TOWN requests SFM and pays CALTRANS' invoice for actual SFM cost.
- PARTNERS will execute a separate maintenance agreement prior to OBLIGATION COMPLETION.

COST

Cost: General

61. PARTNERS will document specific funding, billing, and payment details in a separate FUNDING SUMMARY.

A valid FUNDING SUMMARY must be in place at all times until COMPLETION OF OBLIGATIONS.

PARTNERS will create a new FUNDING SUMMARY each time the funding, billing and payment details of PROJECT change. The FUNDING SUMMARY is only valid after each FUNDING PARTNER signs and dates the FUNDING SUMMARY. The most current fully executed FUNDING SUMMARY supersedes any previous FUNDING SUMMARY created for this Agreement.

A new FUNDING SUMMARY will not require an amendment to this Agreement unless the total funding commitment of a FUNDING PARTNER changes, or the rules of the new funds require it.

Each PARTNER will designate an authorized representative to sign the FUNDING SUMMARY on its behalf.

- 62. PARTNERS may invoice the appropriate FUNDING PARTNER according to the terms documented in the FUNDING SUMMARY.
- 63. If a PARTNER has received Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) certification from CALTRANS, that PARTNER will use the EFT mechanism and follow all EFT procedures to pay all invoices issued from CALTRANS.
- 64. If FUNDING PARTNERS fund OBLIGATIONS with American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) funds, PARTNERS will adopt the terms, conditions, requirements, and constraints of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009.
- 65. If FUNDING PARTNERS fund OBLIGATIONS with Proposition 1B Bond funds, PARTNERS will meet the requirements of Government Code Section 8879.20 et al. (Proposition 1 legislation), the governor's Executive Order 2007-S-02-07, and the California Transportation Commission (CTC) program guidelines for the applicable account.
 - Right of way purchased using Proposition 1B Bond funds will become the property of CALTRANS, and any revenue from the sale of excess lands originally purchased with bond funds will revert to CALTRANS.
- 66. The cost of any awards, judgments, or settlements generated by OBLIGATIONS is an OBLIGATIONS cost.
- 67. CALTRANS, independent of PROJECT, will pay or cause to be paid all costs for HM MANAGEMENT ACTIVITIES related to HM-1 found within the existing SHS right of way.
- 68. TOWN, independent of PROJECT, will pay or cause to be paid all costs for HM MANAGEMENT ACTIVITIES related to HM-1 found within PROJECT limits and outside the existing SHS right of way.
- 69. HM MANAGEMENT ACTIVITIES costs related to HM-2 are CONSTRUCTION SUPPORT and CONSTRUCTION CAPITAL costs.
- 70. The cost to comply with and implement the commitments set forth in the environmental documentation is an OBLIGATIONS cost.
- 71. The cost to ensure that PROJECT remains in environmental compliance is an OBLIGATIONS cost.
- 72. The cost of any legal challenges to the CEQA or NEPA environmental process or documentation is an OBLIGATIONS cost.

- 73. Independent of OBLIGATIONS cost, CALTRANS will fund the cost of its own IQA for WORK done within existing or proposed future SHS right of way.
- 74. CALTRANS will provide encroachment permits to PARTNERS, their contractors, consultants and agents, at no cost.
- 75. Fines, interest, or penalties levied against a PARTNER will be paid, independent of OBLIGATIONS cost, by the PARTNER whose actions or lack of action caused the levy.
- 76. If federal funds are used on PROJECT while this Agreement is active CALTRANS will administer all federal subvention funds documented on the FUNDING SUMMARY.
- 77. Travel, per diem, and third-party contract reimbursements are an OBLIGATIONS cost only after those hired by PARTNERS to participate in OBLIGATIONS incur and pay those costs.
 - Payments for travel and per diem will not exceed the rates paid rank and file state employees under current California Department of Personnel Administration (DPA) rules current at the effective date of this Agreement.
 - If TOWN invoices for rates in excess of DPA rates, TOWN will fund the cost difference and reimburse CALTRANS for any overpayment.
- 78. The cost of any engineering support performed by CALTRANS includes all direct and applicable indirect costs. CALTRANS calculates indirect costs based solely on the type of funds used to pay support costs. State and federal funds are subject to the current Program Functional Rate. Local funds are subject to the current Program Functional Rate and the current Administration Rate. The Program Functional Rate and Administration Rate are adjusted periodically.
- 79. If CALTRANS reimburses TOWN for any costs later determined to be unallowable, TOWN will reimburse those funds.
- 80. The cost to place PROJECT right of way in a safe and operable condition and meet all environmental commitments is an OBLIGATIONS cost.
- 81. Because IMPLEMENTING AGENCY is responsible for managing the scope, cost, and schedule of a project component, if there are insufficient funds available in this Agreement to place PROJECT right of way in a safe and operable condition, the appropriate IMPLEMENTING AGENCY accepts responsibility to fund these activities until such time as PARTNERS amend this Agreement.

That IMPLEMENTING AGENCY may request reimbursement for these costs during the amendment process.

82. If there are insufficient funds in this Agreement to implement applicable commitments and conditions included in the PROJECT environmental documentation, permits, agreements, and/or approvals that are in effect at a time that WORK stops, each PARTNER implementing commitments or conditions accepts responsibility to fund these activities, as they apply to each PARTNER's responsibilities, until such time as PARTNERS amend this Agreement.

Each PARTNER may request reimbursement for these costs during the amendment process.

83. PARTNERS will pay invoices within 30 calendar days of receipt of invoice.

Cost: Environmental Permits, Approvals and Agreements

84. The cost of coordinating, obtaining, complying with, implementing, including renewing and amending resource agency permits, agreements, and approvals is an OBLIGATIONS cost.

Cost: CONSTRUCTION Support

85. The cost to maintain the SHS within PROJECT limits is an OBLIGATIONS cost until PARTNERS execute a separate maintenance agreement.

Cost: CONSTRUCTION Capital

86. The cost of all SFM is a CONSTRUCTION CAPITAL cost

CALTRANS will invoice TOWN for the actual cost of any SFM as a CONSTRUCTION CAPITAL cost.

After PARTNERS agree that all WORK is complete, CALTRANS will submit a final accounting for all SFM costs. Based on the final accounting, PARTNERS will refund or invoice as necessary in order to satisfy the financial commitments of this Agreement.

SCHEDULE

87. PARTNERS will manage the schedule for OBLIGATIONS through the work plan included in the PROJECT MANAGEMENT PLAN.

GENERAL CONDITIONS

88. PARTNERS understand that this Agreement is in accordance with and governed by the Constitution and laws of the State of California. This Agreement will be enforceable in the State of California. Any PARTNER initiating legal action arising from this

Agreement will file and maintain that legal action in the Superior Court of the county in which the CALTRANS district office that is signatory to this Agreement resides, or in the Superior Court of the county in which PROJECT is physically located.

- 89. All OBLIGATIONS of CALTRANS under the terms of this Agreement are subject to the appropriation of resources by the Legislature, the State Budget Act authority, and the allocation of funds by the California Transportation Commission.
- 90. When CALTRANS performs IQA activities it does so for its own benefit. No one can assign liability to CALTRANS due to its IQA activities.
- 91. Neither TOWN nor any officer or employee thereof is responsible for any injury, damage or liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by CALTRANS and/or its agents under or in connection with any work, authority, or jurisdiction conferred upon CALTRANS under this Agreement.
 - It is understood and agreed that CALTRANS will fully defend, indemnify, and save harmless TOWN and all of its officers and employees from all claims, suits, or actions of every name, kind, and description brought forth under, but not limited to, tortious, contractual, inverse condemnation, or other theories or assertions of liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by CALTRANS and/or its agents under this Agreement.
- 92. Neither CALTRANS nor any officer or employee thereof is responsible for any injury, damage, or liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by TOWN and/or its agents under or in connection with any work, authority, or jurisdiction conferred upon TOWN under this Agreement.
 - It is understood and agreed that TOWN will fully defend, indemnify, and save harmless CALTRANS and all of its officers and employees from all claims, suits, or actions of every name, kind, and description brought forth under, but not limited to, tortious, contractual, inverse condemnation, or other theories or assertions of liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by TOWN and/or its agents under this Agreement.
- 93. PARTNERS do not intend this Agreement to create a third party beneficiary or define duties, obligations, or rights in parties not signatory to this Agreement. PARTNERS do not intend this Agreement to affect their legal liability by imposing any standard of care for fulfilling OBLIGATIONS different from the standards imposed by law.
- 94. PARTNERS will not assign or attempt to assign OBLIGATIONS to parties not signatory to this Agreement.
- 95. PARTNERS will not interpret any ambiguity contained in this Agreement against each other. PARTNERS waive the provisions of California Civil Code section 1654.

- 96. A waiver of a PARTNER's performance under this Agreement will not constitute a continuous waiver of any other provision. An amendment made to any article or section of this Agreement does not constitute an amendment to or negate all other articles or sections of this Agreement.
- 97. A delay or omission to exercise a right or power due to a default does not negate the use of that right or power in the future when deemed necessary.
- 98. If any PARTNER defaults in its OBLIGATIONS, a non-defaulting PARTNER will request in writing that the default be remedied within 30 calendar days. If the defaulting PARTNER fails to do so, the non-defaulting PARTNER may initiate dispute resolution.
- 99. PARTNERS will first attempt to resolve Agreement disputes at the PROJECT team level. If they cannot resolve the dispute themselves, the CALTRANS district director and the executive officer of TOWN will attempt to negotiate a resolution. If PARTNERS do not reach a resolution, PARTNERS' legal counsel will initiate mediation. PARTNERS agree to participate in mediation in good faith and will share equally in its costs.

Neither the dispute nor the mediation process relieves PARTNERS from full and timely performance of OBLIGATIONS in accordance with the terms of this Agreement. However, if any PARTNER stops fulfilling OBLIGATIONS, any other PARTNER may seek equitable relief to ensure that OBLIGATIONS continue.

Except for equitable relief, no PARTNER may file a civil complaint until after mediation, or 45 calendar days after filing the written mediation request, whichever occurs first.

PARTNERS will file any civil complaints in the Superior Court of the county in which the CALTRANS district office signatory to this Agreement resides or in the Superior Court of the county in which PROJECT is physically located. The prevailing PARTNER will be entitled to an award of all costs, fees, and expenses, including reasonable attorney fees as a result of litigating a dispute under this Agreement or to enforce the provisions of this article including equitable relief.

- 100. PARTNERS maintain the ability to pursue alternative or additional dispute remedies if a previously selected remedy does not achieve resolution.
- 101. If any provisions in this Agreement are found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be, or are in fact, illegal, inoperative, or unenforceable, those provisions do not render any or all other Agreement provisions invalid, inoperative, or unenforceable, and those provisions will be automatically severed from this Agreement.
- 102. PARTNERS intend this Agreement to be their final expression and supersede any oral understanding or writings pertaining to OBLIGATIONS.

- 103. If during performance of WORK additional activities or environmental documentation is necessary to keep PROJECT in environmental compliance, PARTNERS will amend this Agreement to include completion of those additional tasks.
- 104. Except as otherwise provided in the Agreement, PARTNERS will execute a formal written amendment if there are any changes to OBLIGATIONS.
- 105. This Agreement will terminate upon OBLIGATION COMPLETION or an amendment to terminate this Agreement, whichever occurs first.
 - However, all indemnification, document retention, audit, claims, environmental commitment, legal challenge, and ownership articles will remain in effect until terminated or modified in writing by mutual agreement.
- 106. The following documents are attached to, and made an express part of this Agreement: SCOPE SUMMARY.

CALTRANS STANDARDS – CALTRANS policies and procedures, including, but not limited to, the guidance provided in the *Guide to Capital Project Delivery Workplan Standards* (previously known as WBS Guide) available at http://www.dot.ca.gov/hq/projmgmt/guidance.htm.

CEQA (California Environmental Quality Act) – The act (California Public Resources Code, sections 21000 et seq.) that requires state and local agencies to identify the significant environmental impacts of their actions and to avoid or mitigate those significant impacts, if feasible.

CFR (Code of Federal Regulations) – The general and permanent rules published in the Federal Register by the executive departments and agencies of the federal government.

CONSTRUCTION CAPITAL - See PROJECT COMPONENT.

CONSTRUCTION SUPPORT – See PROJECT COMPONENT.

COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT CLOSURE STATEMENT – A document signed by PARTNERS that verifies the completion of all OBLIGATIONS included in this Agreement and in all amendments to this Agreement.

FHWA – Federal Highway Administration

FHWA STANDARDS – FHWA regulations, policies and procedures, including, but not limited to, the guidance provided at www.fhwa.dot.gov/topics.htm.

FUNDING PARTNER – A PARTNER that commits a defined dollar amount to fulfill OBLIGATIONS. Each FUNDING PARTNER accepts responsibility to provide the funds it commits in this Agreement.

FUNDING SUMMARY – A document separate from this Agreement that documents the details of funding and billing/payment arrangements. Details include, but are not limited to, fund source, fund type, payment method, invoice frequency, deposit amounts and PROJECT COMPONENT in which funds are to be spent. Funds listed on the FUNDING SUMMARY are "not-to-exceed" amounts for each FUNDING PARTNER.

GAAP (Generally Accepted Accounting Principles) – Uniform minimum standards and guidelines for financial accounting and reporting issued by the Federal Accounting Standards Advisory Board that serve to achieve some level of standardization. See http://www.fasab.gov/accepted.html.

HM-1 – Hazardous material (including, but not limited to, hazardous waste) that may require removal and disposal pursuant to federal or state law whether it is disturbed by PROJECT or not.

HM-2 – Hazardous material (including, but not limited to, hazardous waste) that may require removal and disposal pursuant to federal or state law only if disturbed by PROJECT.

HM MANAGEMENT ACTIVITIES – Management activities related to either HM-1 or HM-2 including, without limitation, any necessary manifest requirements and disposal facility designations.

IMPLEMENTING AGENCY – The PARTNER is responsible for managing the scope, cost, and schedule of a PROJECT COMPONENT to ensure the completion of that component.

IQA (Independent Quality Assurance) – Ensuring that IMPLEMENTING AGENCY's quality assurance activities result in WORK being developed in accordance with the applicable standards and within an established Quality Management Plan (QMP). IQA does not include any work necessary to actually develop or deliver WORK or any validation by verifying or rechecking work performed by another PARTNER.

NEPA (National Environmental Policy Act of 1969) – This federal act establishes a national policy for the environment and a process to disclose the adverse impacts of projects with a federal nexus.

OBLIGATION COMPLETION – PARTNERS have fulfilled all OBLIGATIONS included in this Agreement, and all amendments to this Agreement, and have signed a COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT CLOSURE STATEMENT.

OBLIGATIONS – All responsibilities included in this Agreement.

OMB (Office of Management and Budget) – This federal office oversees the preparation of the federal budget and supervises its administration in Executive Branch agencies.

PARTNER – Any individual signatory party to this Agreement.

PARTNERS – The term that collectively references all of the signatory agencies to this Agreement. This term only describes the relationship between these agencies to work together to achieve a mutually beneficial goal. It is not used in the traditional legal sense in which one PARTNER's individual actions legally bind the other PARTNER.

PROJECT – The undertaking to provide the construction of sidewalks and installation of raised curb medians at various locations from La Honda Way to Dumosa Avenue.

PROJECT COMPONENT – A distinct portion of the planning and project development process of a capital project as outlined in California Government Code, section 14529(b).

- **PID (Project Initiation Document)** The activities required to deliver the project initiation document for PROJECT.
- PA&ED (Project Approval and Environmental Document) The activities required to deliver the project approval and environmental documentation for PROJECT.
- PS&E (Plans, Specifications, and Estimate) The activities required to deliver the plans, specifications, and estimate for PROJECT.
- R/W (Right of Way) SUPPORT -The activities required to obtain all property interests for PROJECT.
- R/W (Right of Way) CAPITAL The funds for acquisition of property rights for PROJECT.
- CONSTRUCTION SUPPORT The activities required for the administration, acceptance, and final documentation of the construction contract for PROJECT.
- **CONSTRUCTION CAPITAL** The funds for the construction contract.

PROJECT MANAGEMENT PLAN – A group of documents used to guide a project's execution and control throughout that project's lifecycle.

QMP (Quality Management Plan) – An integral part of the PROJECT MANAGEMENT PLAN that describes IMPLEMENTING AGENCY's quality policy and how it will be used.

RESIDENT ENGINEER – A civil engineer licensed in the State of California who is responsible for construction contract administration activities. Said engineer must be independent of the design engineering company and the construction contractor.

SAFETEA-LU – Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users.

SCOPE SUMMARY – The attachment in which each PARTNER designates its commitment to specific scope activities within each PROJECT COMPONENT as outlined by the *Guide to Capital Project Delivery Workplan Standards* (previously known as WBS Guide) available at http://www.dot.ca.gov/hq/projmgmt/guidance.htm.

SHS (State Highway System) – All highways, right of way, and related facilities acquired, laid out, constructed, improved, or maintained as a state highway pursuant to constitutional or legislative authorization.

SPONSOR – Any PARTNER that accepts the responsibility to establish scope of PROJECT and the obligation to secure financial resources to fund PROJECT. SPONSOR is responsible for adjusting the PROJECT scope to match committed funds or securing additional funds to fully fund the PROJECT scope. If a PROJECT has more than one SPONSOR, funding adjustments will be made by percentage (as outlined in Responsibilities). Scope adjustments must be developed through the project development process and must be approved by CALTRANS as the owner/operator of the SHS.

SFM (State Furnished Material) – Any materials or equipment supplied by CALTRANS.

WORK - All scope activities included in this Agreement.

Prior Agency Review:

• The former Yucca Valley Redevelopment Agency ("Agency") authorized the release of the Request for Qualifications at its meeting of June 15, 2010.

- The Agency approved the selection of National Community Renaissance of California (NCRC) as the development entity to deliver an affordable senior housing opportunity at its meeting of October 19, 2010.
- The Agency reviewed site alternatives at its meeting of November 16, 2010 and recommended the Dumosa site as the preferred site for the proposed Project.
- The Agency authorized an Exclusive Negotiating Agreement (ENA) with NCRC on December 21, 2010.
- The Town Council approved the Yucca Valley Senior Affordable Housing Specific Plan (S01-11) and Conditional Use Permit (CUP 03-11) on May 17, 2011.
- The Agency approved an Option Agreement providing site control of the Dumosa property on May 17, 2011.
- The Town Council approved the Financing, Disposition and Development Agreement (FDDA) between the Town and NCRC establishing the terms under which the Town would support development of a seventy-five unit affordable senior housing project on March 20, 2012

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Town Council:

- Receive update and provide comments regarding potential modification to the FDDA; and
- 2. Direct staff to bring back all documents required to support the NCRC application for Tax Credits as part of a July Tax Credit Allocation submittal;

Executive Summary: On October 19, 2010, the former Yucca Valley Redevelopment Agency selected National Community Renaissance of California (NCRC) as their preferred development entity to deliver an affordable senior housing project in the Town of Yucca Valley. Since that selection, NCRC and the Town have made great strides to bring the concept of an affordable senior housing project to fruition by:

- Selecting the Dumosa / SR-62 site as a preferred location on November 16, 2010;
- Approving an Exclusive Negotiating Agreement (ENA) on December 21, 2010;
- Developing and approving the Yucca Valley Senior Affordable Housing Specific Plan (S01-11) and Conditional Use Permit (CUP 03-11) on May 17, 2011;
- Completing an application for HUD-202 funding;
- Securing HOME program funds through the County of San Bernardino in the amount of \$1,622,830;
- Securing Sec 518 USDA Permanent Financing in the amount of \$1,451,000
- Approved of the Financing, Disposition and Development Agreement (FDDA) between the Town and NCRC on March 20, 2012;
- Completing an application for the first round of the Tax Credit Allocation Committee for the March 22, 2012 TCAC Cycle;

The California Tax Credit Allocation Committee (TCAC) conducts two tax credit grant award cycles. Tax credit financing is a popular source of funding for affordable housing projects. Based upon recent grant cycles, NCRC and Town staff worked to complete an application for the March 22, 2012 TCAC Cycle. While our project achieves maximum points due to the amenities associated with the project, our tie-breaker was insufficient to secure tax credit funding. Staff has worked with NCRC to improve the competitiveness of our application.

Discussion:

Since receiving direction in December 2010, NCRC, Agency and Town staff has worked diligently in meeting the accelerated timelines associated with the various funding opportunities available to the project. Given the scope and quality of the proposed affordable housing project, it would not be possible for the Town to construct such an asset without the leveraging of other funding sources. The final funding source required for the project is Low Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTC) awarded from the California Tax Credit Allocation Committee.

TCAC LIHTC Application Process

The TCAC application is a competitive process. Applicants from across the state submit proposals for consideration and are then evaluated based upon criteria summarized in the following table. In the vast majority of TCAC cycles, projects MUST receive maximum points to be competitive and the final decision is then based upon a tie-breaker that factors "local" funding versus the total project costs. The TCAC process also allocates funding to various regions across the state and has separate categories for urban versus rural designation.

The Yucca Valley Senior Affordable Housing project is projected to receive maximum points. The project is entitled (Eval Factor "G" – Readiness to Proceed), the site is adjacent to amenities (Eval Factor D(1) – Site Amenities), there are adequate public funds being provided through the HOME Program and Town loans (Eval Factor A(3) – Public Funds), NCRC has a fantastic track record as the General Partner, Management Company, and Service Amenities provider (various factors). Unlike the HUD-202 process, the TCAC application and evaluation is very transparent and defensible.

Town's Role In Transaction

The Town's participation in the Project is solely as a lender — the Town is not participating in the Project as a developer or owner. Any actions by the Town which are not fully consistent with the Town's role as a lender are intended only to carry out routine government functions and impose constitutionally or statutorily authorized conditions acceptable to the Developer. As such, the Project and the Town's participation through this Agreement are outside the scope of California Constitution Article XXXIV and its enabling legislation.

Since the March TCAC Application, Town and NCRC staff have worked to improve the competitiveness of our application through cost reductions and potential increases in the Town's Loan to the project. These include:

- Construction Strategy: Through an innovative construction strategy, NCRC has been able to reduce the estimated cost of the Project from \$18.9 million to approximately \$17.3 million. This action alone improves the tie-breaker. This estimated cost includes the Site acquisition costs and the hard and soft costs of constructing the Project which will provide affordable housing to income-qualified seniors for a guaranteed 55-year term; and
- Infrastructure Reduction: Town staff considered removal of a number of project elements that deliver regional infrastructure. These included the flood control improvements along Dumosa, re-alignment of Dumosa, and the traffic signal improvement at SR-62 & Dumosa. While cutting the cost of the project improves the competitiveness, it is less beneficial than simply increasing the amount of loan from the Town. Staff recommends against reducing the scope of infrastructure associated with the project;
- Town Loan Increase: Based upon the infrastructure being delivered by the project and prior actions from the former Redevelopment Agency, there are a number of funding sources available that support this increased loan amount:

To improve the competitiveness of the application in the July TCAC competition, Town staff is recommending to Town Council to increase the Town Loan to NCRC to an amount of \$1,985,000. Coupled with the cost savings due to the innovative construction approach, the tie-breaker is improved considerably, to a level that would have received funding in the March TCAC competition.

Alternatives: Town Council could recommend that the Town maintain its loan amount at the authorized level from March (\$635,000), increase the loan amount partially, or direct staff to not apply for the July TCAC application

Fiscal Impact: Town staff has identified sources of potential funding to increase the Town Loan up to the recommended amount of \$1,985,000. Any subsequent disbursements would occur ONLY after successful tax credit award to NCRC by TCAC.
